ABOUT THE PROGRAM

Welcome to *Spring Sing!*, presented by the Piedmont East Bay Children's Choir. Today's program brings the entire choir family together, both to celebrate the musical accomplishments of our singers and to honor our graduating seniors.

This 39th season has been a year like none other. I am deeply grateful to all of you — our singers, our families, our community — for keeping the music alive during a year of loss and love, heartbreak and hope. I have been so impressed by the vocal strength, confidence, and independence our singers have developed this year, guided by our resourceful conductors, collaborative pianists, voice teachers, TAs, and Zoom hosts. We will emerge on the other side having discovered our voices anew, as stronger singers and as a stronger community.

The Spring Sing is a cherished tradition for the choir. There's truly something special about watching our singers grow and develop, all the way from our youngest KinderChoir students to the remarkable young people of Ecco and Ancora. It's a concert that shows us who we have been, who we are, and who we might become.

In that spirit, this year's Spring Sing tells the story of the journey each of our singers takes through the choirs. We'll start with songs about new beginnings, explore the natural beauty of choir camp and the adventures of tour, and then return home to where we started, changed by the journey.

Artistic Director

I. New Beginnings

Our first set of songs celebrates the excitement of fresh starts and new beginnings. Ecco begins with a celebration of spring by our Artistic Director, Eric Tuan, entitled *Arise, my love, my fair one*. This joyful piece sets an evocative text from the Song of Solomon, the ancient Hebrew love poem that was later incorporated into the Tanakh. The blooming of flowers and the singing of birds became a metaphor for the budding relationship between two young lovers: "Arise, my love, my fair one, and come away!"

Girls Training 4 offers a rousing American folksong, *Goin' to Boston*, in an arrangement by Tennessee-based music educator Shirley W. McRae. The energetic dance is accentuated by train whistle, flute (played by choir alum Will Adams), and a sparkling piano part delivered by collaborative pianist Kymry Esainko.

We close this section of the program with Girls Training 2, who perform a medley of African-American spirituals titled *Rise*, *Shine*, *Little Light!* The medley prominently features "This Little Light of Mine," which was originally composed during the 1920s by the pastor and music teacher Harry Dixon Loes. During the 1950s, the activist and musician Zilphia Horton adapted it into one of the leading anthems of the Civil Rights movement.

II. Off to Camp

One of the most cherished parts of the PEBCC experience is our annual summer camp, where we enjoy a wonderful week of singing together, working on theory and musicianship, and experiencing the great outdoors through hiking, swimming, and stargazing. The next section of our program explores the beauty of nature through song and story.

Concert Choir begins with an evocative partsong by the Anglo-African composer Samuel Coleridge-Taylor, one of the most celebrated composers of the Victorian era. After hearing the premiere of Coleridge-Taylor's cantata *Hiawatha's Wedding Feast* – which would come to rival Handel's *Messiah* in its popularity – the composer Sir Arthur Sullivan remarked in his diary:

Much impressed by the lad's genius. He is a composer, not a music-maker. The music is fresh and original – he has melody and harmony in abundance, and his scoring is brilliant and full of colour – at times luscious, rich and sensual.

Born in London to a Krio physician from Sierra Leone and an English mother, Coleridge-Taylor was recognized as a musical prodigy from an early age. He studied at the Royal Conservatory of Music before embarking on a career as a widely performed composer and conductor.

During his concert tours of the United States, Coleridge-Taylor became increasingly interested in his African heritage, in part due to the rapturous welcome he received from African-American audiences. His father, Daniel Taylor, was descended from the "Black Loyalists": African-American slaves who escaped from their American masters to fight for their freedom on the British side during the Revolutionary War. Coleridge-Taylor's grandfather was among the 1200 Black Loyalists who eventually emigrated to Sierra Leone, joining a diverse, pan-African community of freed slaves. Coleridge-Taylor served as the youngest delegate at the 1900 First Pan-African Conference in London, laying the ground for correspondence and artistic collaboration with luminaries in the pan-African movement such as Paul Lawrence Dunbar and W.E.B. Du Bois. His duet *Oh, the Summer* depicts the languid beauty of a summer day, from dawn to dusk, in words by the Canadian poet Isabel Ecclestone Mackay.

KinderChoir then shares a playful description of their favorite aquatic mammal in *The Hippo*, drawn from Clare Grundman's choral suite *Zoo Illogical*. Born in Cleveland, Grundman studied with the composer Paul Hindemith before becoming renowned for his symphonic band works and film scores. In *The Hippo*, his spiky melodies playfully depict the animal as a "vision of rhythm and song."

We then hear from the singers of Training 1, who tell the story of a tiny bird with a very big voice in *Mrs. Jenny Wren*. This delightful song was composed by Arthur Baynon, an English organist and music educator who served as organist at one of the UK's most famous musical institutions, the choir school of St Michael's College, Tenbury. The words are by Rodney Bennett, a children's book author and father to the renowned composer Sir Richard Rodney Bennett.

We return to the music of Samuel Coleridge-Taylor to close this section of our program, as Ancora shares the sirens' chorus from his incidental music to Stephen Phillips's play *Ulysses*. This dramatization of the legend of Ulysses (or Odysseus in Greek) prominently features the sirens of ancient Greek mythology, who would sing to lure sailors to shipwreck on the coastal rocks of their island. Their enchanting song is depicted in From the *Green Heart of the Waters*, as a chorus of upper voices sings to Ulysses over a rippling, watery piano accompaniment.

III. Away on Tour

One of the most unique elements of the Piedmont East Bay Children's Choir is our commitment to international exchange. Every summer, the singers of Ensemble embark on an international tour, where we perform at competitions and festivals, engage in cultural exchange with choral partners from around the globe. Our singers have the opportunity to homestay with fellow singers all over the world, experiencing another culture from within, and to return the favor when their newfound friends visit us in the Bay Area for our triennial Golden Gate International Choral Festival.

PEBCC has a special relationship with choirs from the countries of Finland and Estonia, which we typically visit every five years and which are tied by deep bonds of language, culture, and history. Our next three songs all come from our exchanges with our choral partners in the region, including Vox Aurea, the Tapiola Choir, and the Estonian Television Girls' Choir.

Ensemble is honored to have a long relationship with the renowned Finnish children's choir Vox Aurea ("The Voice of Gold"); we have visited them three times in Finland, and they in turn have visited us twice in the Bay Area. During the pandemic, we decided to embark on a joint recording project together celebrating one of the monuments of Finnish musical culture: the 1582 collection of school songs, *Piae Cantiones*. This anthology features some of the greatest hits of the medieval and Renaissance period, many of which have survived as popular Christmas carols such as "Good King Wenceslas" and "Gaudete." Although the songs are a matter of great national pride for Finnish musicians, they have never before been recorded in medieval Finnish.

Vox Aurea's conductor Sanna Salminen decided to fill that gap with a joint recording project between Vox Aurea and PEBCC. First, Sanna recorded backing tracks with a wonderful band of medieval musicians playing such colorful instruments as the medieval harp, medieval fiddle, viola da gamba, santur (a type of hammered dulcimer), and percussion. Then, the singers of Vox Aurea and Ensemble recorded the vocal parts with the help of Professor Aila Mielikäinen of the University of Jyväskylä, who shared her pioneering research into the pronunciation of medieval Finnish. Finally, the singers recorded videos sharing the natural beauty of their respective communities.

This afternoon, we share the lilting melody of *In Vernali Tempore*, which offers languid depiction of spring: "the waves of the sea settle down, the rough winds calm down, the ground is wet with dew." You'll hear the gentle rippling of the santur beneath the murmuring melody of the voices.

Ensemble then shares a piece by Einojuhani Rautavaara, perhaps the leading Finnish composer of the 20th and 21st centuries. Renowned for his ability to blend modernist techniques with mystical moments of breathtaking beauty, Rautavaara taught composition at the Sibelius Academy for decades and composed prolifically across all genres. The *Lapsimessu*, or "Children's Mass," was composed for the legendary Tapiola Choir and was one of two choral works that Rautavaara submitted to a composition contest hosted by the city of Espoo. While the *Lapsimessu* won first prize, it is rarely performed today; it was quickly overshadowed by the third prize winner, Rautavaara's *Suite de Lorca*, which became one of the most popular Finnish choral works of the 20th century.

The opening Kyrie of the *Lapsimessu* illustrates Rautavaara's ability to effortlessly blend seemingly academic compositional techniques, such as as invertible counterpoint, with a beguiling beauty of sound. We look forward to performing the complete work with the Oakland Symphony next spring.

Perhaps the best-loved Estonian composer of modern times is Veljo Tormis, who began his career collecting Estonian folk songs despite the disapproval of the Soviet regime. Tormis rose to prominence with his haunting settings of ancient Baltic runic songs, or *regilaul*, which seek to highlight the hypnotic and repetitive qualities of the melodies rather than conceal them. The mesmerizing soundscape of *regilaul* is on full display in Tormis's work *Karjan kotiinkutsu*, or "Calling Home the Cattle." Here Tormis sets several verses from Finland's national epic, the Kalevala, depicting a group of women calling the cattle home as the sun sets over the marshes. Four soloists call out, "Li, lo, li," as they guide the herd home with sticks of birch and juniper.

We close this set of songs from abroad with a performance from Boys Training 2, under the direction of Nancy Linford. They offer a joyful rendition of *Al Tambor*, a Panamanian folksong inviting us to come dance "to the drum of joy." The arrangement is by the Texas-based composer and music educator Victor C. Johnson, and features Teaching Assistant Jan Warncke and special guest Dave Lazzeroni on percussion, alongside Christine Fernandez on piano.

IV. Homeward Bound

The closing section of today's program, "Homeward Bound," explores the theme of returning home, whether that's a chorister coming home from their first international tour; an alum returning to the choir as a member of the faculty, staff, or board; or all of us, returning to in-person singing after many months apart.

We begin with a traditional Irish blessing sung beautifully by Girls Training 3, *May a Rainbow Run Beside You*. This gently lilting setting was composed by the Texas-based music educator and composer Mark Burrows, and showcases the singers' abilities with expressive melodic lines.

Concert Choir continues with an ethereal setting of the *Lux aeterna*, a blessing for the dead, by the English organist and composer David Briggs. One of the most internationally renowned organists working today, Briggs began his career as organ scholar at King's College, Cambridge before holding positions at the great English cathedrals in Hereford, Truro, and Gloucester. Having studied improvisation with the legendary French organist Jean Langlais, Briggs brings a uniquely French, almost impressionistic sensibility to his music. The shimmering chords and soaring vocal lines of the *Lux aeterna*, drawn from his larger-scale *Requiem*, evoke the flying buttresses of a French cathedral. Under the direction of Andrew Brown, the performance also features choir alum Will Adams on flute and our Artistic Director, Eric Tuan, on the organ.

Our singers often emerge from their choir experience with a truly global perspective and a desire to make the world a better place. After hearing about the ways our Ecco singers are confronting the climate crisis through art, activism, and action, I wanted to commission a piece for them specifically addressing this issue. Over the past year, Ecco has collaborated with our partners from the Stanford Chamber Chorale in the world premiere of a new piece by British composer Kerry Andrew. Her powerful piece *Wake Up* explores the words of young climate activists around the globe, calling the world to action to confront the climate crisis.

Ecco singer Owen Klein captures the energy of the singers and music in these words:

Our planet is heading for a catastrophe. Actually, the catastrophe is happening right now. Human-in-duced climate change is causing seasonal wildfires on the West Coast, frequent hurricanes in the Gulf of Mexico, rising sea levels, ocean acidification, wildlife extinction, air pollution, and much more. Wake up! We need drastic government action to decarbonize our economy and shift to more renewable sources of energy. Do we have what it takes to save our home from ourselves?

Enter Kerry Andrew's "Wake Up," a new piece commissioned by the Piedmont East Bay Children's Choir in collaboration with the Stanford Chamber Chorale. The text of the piece is taken from leading youth climate activists, including Vic Barratt, Jamie Margolin, Greta Thunberg, Ridhima Pandey, and Xiye Bastida. There is also an expressive—yet challenging—body percussion part with claps, slaps, clicks, and stomps!

We have been honored to collaborate with the Stanford Chamber Chorale and their wonderful conductor, Professor Stephen M. Sano, on this world premiere performance. During the course of two joint retreats, Steve and his students have led sectionals for the Ecco singers and shared their perspectives on music, college life, and more. We also had the opportunity to hear from Stanford climate scientist Mike Mastandrea about how climate change is impacting California, the effectiveness of different types of responses, and his own work with the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC). Thank you to Professor Sano, the singers of the Chorale, and Mike Mastandrea for taking part in this project with us and sharing your invaluable insights. I am also deeply grateful to Ecco's Associate Conductor and tech whiz, Joel Chapman, for crafting this powerful digital experience from our individual performances.

We conclude today's program with a Piedmont East Bay Children's Choir tradition – the 200 voices of our combined choirs singing our traditional farewell song, Homeward Bound. During the performance, you'll see footage from the "Graduation Caravan" we undertook in May, where Bob, Eric, and the choir staff visited all of the graduating seniors at their homes to serenade them with *Homeward Bound* and present them with their graduation photos and diplomas.

Thank you for joining us for today's *Spring Sing!* We can't wait to see you all in person as we begin to regather at choir camp this summer and at our regular rehearsals in the fall. It has been a long journey, but we are so grateful to finally be "homeward bound."

A recent study from Harvard University's Music Lab concluded that vocal music is a cross-cultural universal, as much a biological imperative as language. Lifting our voices together in song is part of who we are as a species.

That simple truth has become crystal clear over the course of the past year. Even as the pandemic has turned so much of our lives upside down, it has not dampened our community's deep need to sing. Over Zoom and Jamulus, through video recordings and virtual concerts, I am so proud of

the way our singers, families, faculty, and staff have kept our passion for music alive and undimmed. I am delighted to share the fruit of their efforts during this spring season of virtual concerts.

As Earth Day approaches, we'll sing stories of the earth during a time of unprecedented change in *Making History: Singing the Earth*. Our singers join the Stanford University Chamber Chorale to amplify the voices of youth climate activists in the world premiere of Kerry Andrew's powerful *Wake Up*. We'll also hear songs of springtime performed in collaboration with renowned Finnish children's choir Vox Aurea, and share the world premiere recordings of three works by the Anglo-African composer Samuel Coleridge-Taylor.

We're lifting up voices of the past like Samuel Coleridge-Taylor, supporting our commitment to the Black Voices Matter pledge, and premiering new works like Kerry Andrew's *Wake Up* to educate about climate change. Our collaboration with Vox Aurea sparks deeper friendships and fosters cultural curiosity and a more complete understanding of our place as global citizens. Through these and other efforts, we reflect and fight for the world we wish to see.

PEBCC traditions also create a sense of belonging. As a newcomer to the team, the process of learning the soprano part to *Homeward Bound* to be ready for the graduate car caravan is connecting me to the choirs in a way no meetings, Zoom gatherings, or virtual concerts ever can. ELIZABETH WAGMAN EMIGH


Conductor Girls Training 3, Vocal Pedagogy
